Gospel Meditation:

Have you ever wondered why the magi had gold, frankincense, and myrrh?

Matthew's Gospel tells us, "Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh" (Matt. 2:11). Why are these things their "treasures"? One possible answer is they were magicians and astrologers, and these three items were the tools of their questionable trade. In offering them to Christ, they demonstrate that they will cease using such items to predict or control life. They place this baby-king, the God of Israel, at the center of their lives, and not their own devices of control, manipulation and prediction.

Isn't that what we need to do, too? Consider, for example, the magical power of money, symbolized by the magi's gold. Seemingly whatever we ask of money, it does. It wields a god-like power over the world. It can predict the future by guaranteeing better outcomes for us — which is why it is such a tempting alternative to trusting in God. The problem is such absolute trust in money enslaves us to the economic forces that make money so powerful. In paying homage to Jesus with "gold" (i.e., tithing), we participate in his authority over (and therefore freedom from) the magical sway of money.

What things in your life do you use to predict or control your future? What in your life seems to give you power over the world? Those are your treasures. Are you tired of feeling enslaved to them? Find a way to open them and give them to Christ, and you will be freer.

<u>Meditación del Evangelio:</u>

¿Alguna vez te has preguntado por qué los reyes magos tenían oro, incienso y mirra? El Evangelio de Mateo nos dice: "Entonces abrieron sus tesoros y le ofrecieron regalos de oro, incienso, y mirra" (Mateo 2:11). ¿Por qué son estas cosas sus "tesoros"? Una posible respuesta es que eran magos y astrólogos, y estos tres artículos eran las herramientas de su cuestionable oficio. Al ofrecerlos a Cristo, demuestran que dejarán de usar tales artículos para predecir o controlar la vida. Colocan a este bebé-rey, el Dios de Israel, en el centro de sus vidas, y no sus propios dispositivos de control, manipulación y predicción.

¿No es eso lo que tenemos que hacer nosotros también? Consideremos, por ejemplo, el poder mágico del dinero, simbolizado por el oro de los magos. Aparentemente, cualquier cosa que le pidamos a dinero, lo hace. Ejerce un poder divino sobre el mundo. Puede predecir el futuro garantizándonos mejores resultados, por lo que es una alternativa tan tentadora a confiar en Dios. El problema es que esa confianza absoluta en el dinero nos esclaviza a las fuerzas económicas que hacen que el dinero sea tan poderoso. Al rendir homenaje a Jesús con "oro" (es decir, el diezmo), participamos de su autoridad sobre (y por lo tanto de la libertad de) la influencia mágica del dinero.

¿Qué cosas en tu vida usas para predecir o controlar tu futuro? ¿Qué hay en tu vida que te da poder sobre el mundo? Esos son tus tesoros. ¿Estás cansado de sentirte esclavizado por ellos? Encuentra una manera de abrirlos y dárselos a Cristo, y serás más libre.














Question: Can a divorced Catholic receive Communion?

Answer: Unfortunately, too many people today believe that divorce separates one from the Communion of the Church and that divorced persons may not receive Holy Communion. However, as the Church has communicated a number of times and in a number of places, the issue at hand is not the reality of divorce, but is more often the reality of re-marriage outside of the Church (such as in the case of a Catholic who was married within the Church, divorced, and remarried without receiving an annulment).

Divorced persons are called to live chastely as single people and to observe the same call to avoid sin as anyone else who desires to receive the Eucharist. Beyond this, however, we are reminded us that the healing power of the Eucharist can be especially significant for those who have "endured separation, divorce, or abandonment... divorced people who have not remarried, and often bear witness to marital fidelity, ought to be encouraged to find the nourishment they need to sustain them in their present state of life in the Eucharist ." Moreover, "the local community and pastors should accompany these people with solicitude, particularly when children are involved or when they are in serious financial difficulty."

As Pope Francis has also reminded us, the Eucharist is "not a prize for the perfect," but "a powerful medicine and nourishment" (Evangelii Gaudium, no. 47). Because we all stand in need of healing and wholeness, the Church invites all who seek to live their faith in integrity and devotion to come and receive the grace offered in the Eucharist.

Epiphany Blessing

The Epiphany household blessing is a centuries-old tradition. It's a beautiful way to observe the coming of the magi while invoking God's blessing on your home and all who enter it. All that is needed is chalk and a prayerful heart!

There are a few different formulas for blessings, but the essence of the ritual is always the same: a priest, deacon, or the head of the household calls down God's blessing on the house and everyone who comes into it, and an inscription is made above the door in chalk.

The inscription reads: the (first two digits of the year) + C + M + B + the (last two digits of the year) (20+C+M+B+25). The initials C, M and B represent the names of the magi - Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar, and also signify the Latin phrase Christus Mansionem Benedicat: "May Christ bless the house."

The Blessing: Lord God almighty, Bless + this home, and under its shelter let there be health, chastity, self-conquest, humility, goodness, mildness, obedience to your commandments, and thanksgiving to God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

May Your blessing remain always in this home and on those who live here; through Christ, our Lord. Amen..

> Each room of the house may then be sprinkled with Holy Water – (this is not necessary for the blessing but should be done if Holy Water is available.) (Any chalk will suffice... but you may find a small piece of blessed chalk on the table at the main entrance)

Bendición de la Epifanía

La bendición del hogar de la Epifanía es una tradición centenaria que invoca la bendición de Dios sobre todos los que entran en su hogar. Es una hermosa manera de observar la venida de los Reyes Magos mientras invocas la bendición de Dios sobre tu hogar y todos los que entran en él. ¡Todo lo que se necesita es tiza y un corazón lleno de oración!

Hay algunas fórmulas diferentes para las bendiciones, pero la esencia del ritual es siempre la misma: un sacerdote, un diácono o el cabeza de familia invoca la bendición de Dios sobre la casa y todos los que entran en ella, y se hace una inscripción sobre la puerta con tiza.

La inscripción dice: (los dos primeros dígitos del año) + C + M + B + (los dos últimos dígitos del año)(20 + C + M + B + 25). Las iniciales C, M y B representan los nombres de los magos: Gaspar, Melchor y Baltasar, y también significan la frase latina Christus Mansionem Benedicat: "Que Cristo bendiga la casa".

La Bendición: Señor Dios todopoderoso, Bendice + este hogar, y bajo su abrigo haya salud, castidad, conquista propia, humildad, bondad, apacibilidad, obediencia a tus mandamientos y acción de gracias a Dios el Padre, el Hijo y el Espíritu Santo.

Que Tu bendición permanezca siempre en este hogar y en los que viven aquí; por Cristo, nuestro Señor. Amén.
