Gospel Meditation:

I craved four things as a teenager: success in sports, food, fun and the attention of popular people. However, I noticed that as I acquired them, I was more unsatisfied than before. So, I'd strive even more energetically, achieve more, and the sense of emptiness was greater still. These four things started to feel like burdens or even curses. Soon after, I encountered Christ in my high school youth group. Experiencing his love was totally different than anything those four things previously produced. It produced a lasting happiness.

Jesus utters a kind of four-fold curse in this week's Gospel of Saint Luke's "woes": "Woe to you who are rich... who are filled now...who laugh now...who are well-spoken of" (cf. Luke 6:24-26). How marvelous that these correspond perfectly to the four things that obsessed my teenage soul: riches, food, laughter and good reputation. The "woes" the Lord speaks are warnings: when those things are the purpose of your life, you'll be miserable. He is saying, "You'll be happy, or blessed, in the measure that these things do not determine the shape of our lives, and the kingdom of God does."

To some degree, we're all spiritual teenagers, addicted to one or more of those four "woes." How splendid that the Lord wants his to bless us — that is, to satisfy us, make us laugh with joy, and in the kingdom of God, offer us what will truly satisfy us. But first let's admit what is causing our "woes."

<u>Meditación del Evangelio:</u>

Anhelaba cuatro cosas cuando era adolescente: el éxito en los deportes, la comida, la diversión y la atención de la gente popular. Sin embargo, me di cuenta de que a medida que los adquiría, estaba más insatisfecho que antes. Así que me esforzaba aún más enérgicamente, lograba más, y la sensación de vacío era aún mayor. Estas cuatro cosas comenzaron a sentirse como cargas o incluso maldiciones. Poco después, me encontré con Cristo en mi grupo de jóvenes de la escuela secundaria. Experimentar su amor fue totalmente diferente a todo lo que esas cuatro cosas produjeron anteriormente. Producía una felicidad duradera.

Jesús pronuncia una especie de cuádruple maldición en el Evangelio de esta semana sobre los "aflicciones" de san Lucas: "¡Ay de vosotros, ricos... que están llenos ahora... que ahora ríen... de los que se habla bien" (cf. Lc 6, 24-26). Qué maravilloso que correspondan perfectamente a las cuatro cosas que obsesionaban mi alma adolescente: la riqueza, la comida, la risa y la buena reputación. Los "ayes" que el Señor habla son advertencias: cuando esas cosas son el propósito de tu vida, serás miserable. Él está diciendo: "Serás feliz, o bendecido, en la medida en que estas cosas no determinen la forma de nuestras vidas, y el reino de Dios sí".

Hasta cierto punto, todos somos adolescentes espirituales, adictos a uno o más de esos cuatro "males". ¡Qué espléndido que el Señor quiera que nos bendiga, es decir, que nos satisfaga, que nos haga reír de alegría y, en el reino de Dios, que nos ofrezca lo que verdaderamente nos satisfaga! Pero primero, admitamos lo que está causando nuestros "males".

Question: Carnivale and Mardi Gras celebrations are linked to Ash Wednesday, Lent, fast and abstinence.

Tell us more about the connections between these events?

Answer: Ash Wednesday is the beginning of the forty days known as Lent. Christians highlight this penitential season as a time of self-examination, reformation of one's life, and continued development of a deeper spiritual life. The recommended practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving become the focus of Lenten activity and ritual. Each of these spiritual practices is aimed at personal discipline as well as continued concern for others, especially the poor or alienated.

Forty days is a symbolic biblical period of time, during which personal transformation occurs and out of which people surface as more spiritual, ready to carry out God's mission. Relying on God's providence and care, no matter how difficult life becomes, is crucial to Lenten spirituality. Fasting was initially stricter, permitting only one simple meal a day without meat, fish, or other delicacies. Such things were not even allowed in the house.

In order to prepare for this in an age of no refrigeration, people gathered to consume whatever was not allowed during Lent. This led to parties or celebrations originally referred to as *Carnivale*, literally meaning "goodbye to meat," or *Mardi Gras*, literally meaning "Fat Tuesday." The eating and celebrating ended on the Tuesday just before Ash Wednesday. Today we focus more on moderation in all things, as well as a strong concern the poor.

What is an indulgence?

An indulgence is a gift... special grace that removes the temporal punishment for sins already forgiven,

A *Plenary Indulgence* removes ALL punishment, cleansing the soul as if the person had just been baptized.

A Partial Indulgence removes some (or part) of the punishment.

Sins and Forgiveness

When we sin, God forgives us through the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession).

After forgiveness is received, consequences or effects (temporal punishment) caused by the sin may remain.

These effects need healing.

Temporal Punishment

• This is the effect of sin that needs to be healed after forgiveness is granted. Spiritually, temporal punishment is a way of restoring and healing the relationship with God and others, often seen as purification that can happen in this life or in purgatory after death.

With Lent fast approaching, I thought we might look at a Lenten-Devotion or two.

Stations of the Cross. A quick / short explanation

In the earliest years of Christianity, the locations central to the story of Holy Week — the *Garden of Gethsemane, Calvary, the Holy Sepulcher, and more* — were destinations for pilgrims who wanted to experience Christ's sacrificial love for us in a physical way.

In the years after the Crusades, pilgrimage to the Holy Land became impossible for most Christians. The expense, time, and danger were just too great. In response to this, the Stations of the Cross were instituted and popularized as a devotional means to pray through the passion and death of Christ.

Throughout history the number of stations has varied, with different traditions focusing on different events. In the 18th century, the number was officially fixed at 14 by Pope Clement XII. These stations are taken from the Gospel accounts of Christ's passion and death, though there are several which are derived from tradition and apocryphal sources, such as the meeting of Mother and Son and St. Veronica wiping the face of Christ.

The faithful may obtain an indulgence (Plenary of Partial) - see above - by the pious exercise of this devotion.
