Gospel Meditation:

Maybe I'm weird, but I like spending time in doctor's offices, confession lines in churches, auto repair shops, prison cells, and support groups of various kinds. It's refreshing to be with people who humbly admit something is wrong and forthrightly set out on a path toward a solution. When we ignore what is off kilter, we become alone and fragile. In places where people are honest and hopeful about brokenness, sturdy if subtle fellowship usually ensues.

Consider the image we see of Jesus in the Gospel of Mark. "...they brought to him all who were ill or possessed by a demon. The whole town was gathered at the door." The entire human community is afflicted in various ways,

and so it gradually forms a strange new community around Jesus. The healer from Nazareth is like a sun of health around which orbits a throng of humanity absorbing his healing rays. These blessed souls can't fix themselves and become healthy, and they know it. But they have found in him the living source of all imaginable healing.

It's the Church, isn't it? A sin-sick community gathered and healed is what happens at the beginning of every Mass. We shuffle in through the door from everywhere and announce that we are not okay, and we can't fix it. In doing so, we are drawn into the orbit of the healing power of Christ — and into a renewed community with the whole human family. It's nothing to fear or rush. Maybe we can even learn to enjoy more how good it is to be in such a happy place.

Meditación del Evangelio:

Tal vez soy raro, pero me gusta pasar tiempo en consultorios médicos, colas de confesión en iglesias, talleres de reparación de automóviles, celdas de prisión y grupos de apoyo de varios tipos. Es refrescante estar con personas que admiten humildemente que algo anda mal y emprenden un camino directo hacia una solución. Cuando ignoramos lo que está fuera de lugar, nos volvemos solos y frágiles. En los lugares donde las personas son honestas y tienen esperanzas acerca del quebrantamiento, por lo general se produce una comunión sólida, aunque sutil.

Consideremos la imagen que vemos de Jesús en el Evangelio de Marcos. "... Le trajeron a todos los enfermos o poseídos por un demonio. Todo el pueblo estaba reunido a la puerta". Toda la comunidad humana está afligida de diversas maneras, por lo que poco a poco forma una nueva y extraña comunidad en torno a Jesús. El sanador de Nazaret es como un sol de salud alrededor del cual orbita una multitud de humanidad que absorbe sus rayos curativos. Estas almas benditas no pueden arreglarse a sí mismas y volverse saludables, y lo saben. Pero han encontrado en él la fuente viva de toda curación imaginable.

Es la Iglesia, ¿no es así? Una comunidad enferma de pecado reunida y sanada es lo que sucede al comienzo de cada Misa. Entramos por la puerta desde todas partes y anunciamos que no estamos bien y que no podemos arreglarlo. Al hacerlo, somos atraídos a la órbita del poder sanador de Cristo, y a una comunidad renovada con toda la familia humana. No hay nada que temer ni apresurarse. Tal vez incluso podamos aprender a disfrutar más de lo bueno que es estar en un lugar tan feliz.

Un paseo por la temporada de Cuaresma





A "BLAST From the Past" - the Miraculous Medal



One of our Parishioners brought me a copy of a "Deacon's Corner" from 11 years ago!!! (Thanks Melba)

I thought it might be a good time to refresh some memories... just in case you forgot... lol~!

I know many of you are aware of this devotion...

I've seen a number of parishioners wearing the Miraculous Medal... but I also know that many parishioners, while they may have heard the title, 'Miraculous Medal', don't really know what it is or represents.

Likewise, some may wear the medal simply as jewelry and don't understand its significance.

So, I thought I'd take a minute or two today and share its background.

The Miraculous Medal goes back to July of 1830; and to Paris, France.

A young religious, Catherine, (now Saint), Labouré of the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, was awakened on the night of July 18th by the voice of a child calling her to the sisters' chapel (located in the Rue du Bac, Paris). She went to the chapel and heard the Blessed Virgin Mary say to her, "God wishes to charge you with a mission. You will be contradicted, but do not fear; you will have the grace to do what is necessary. Tell your spiritual director all that passes within you. Times are evil in France and in the world."

On November 27th the Blessed Mother returned. She displayed herself to Catherine inside an oval frame, standing upon a globe wearing rings of many colors. Around the margin of the frame the words "O Mary, Conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee" appeared. As she (Catherine) watched, the frame rotated showing a circle of 12 stars, a large letter 'M' surmounted by a cross with a crossbar beneath it. Under all was an image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus – crowned with thorns, and an image of the Immaculate Heart of Mary – pierced with a sword (as prophesied by Simeon).

Her fingers each had three rings and the largest stones emitted the most brilliant rays over the globe. Catherine noticed that some of the gems did not give off rays. When asked, Our Lady explained that the rays were symbols of the graces which would be bestowed on all who asked for them... those with no rays symbolized those graces for which people forget to ask.

A command was given to have a medal struck after the model revealed, and a promise of great graces was made to those who wear it when blessed. After 2 years of careful investigation, and with the approval of the Archbishop of Paris, the first medals were struck in June of 1832. The devotion spread rapidly.

There are literally hundreds – if not thousands - of divine intervention/assistance associated with the wearing of this medal. Miracles of conversion... miracles of healing... miracles of protections... and more! Too many to list here. I invite you to Google 'miraculous medal miracles' to see some of them for yourself.

So... pray to our Holy Mother... ask for her intercession...

But remember... the Miraculous Medal itself is not magical... it's nothing more than a piece of metal.

What holds the power is what / who it represents.

Light up those rings / graces that up to now have been unused (those graces for which people forget to ask)!
